A Plague on Both Your Houses!

We are delighted to announce the return of the London Drama Play Writing Challenge. Some of you will recall this event which was extremely popular a few years ago. We have been trying to position ourselves for re-launching this for some time and have now found ourselves in a position to do so.

Why now? There is little in London and nationwide to nurture youth playwriting.

The writing of plays is one immediate tangible way of recording the wealth of work we carry out in Drama education.

The advent of the EBacc means even more threat to the future of this essential art form and the production of our next generation of playwrights - we aim to counter this threat with the Challenge.

The curriculum is burdensome for Drama teachers who would love to support playwriting in addition to what they already do - but simply have no space nor opportunity to do so.

This event will enable young playwrights to meet and learn from each other as artists and so start a generation of London youth playwrights.

What happens then?

Each entry will be read by a team of drama specialists who will provide a short personalised critique as feedback to each candidate.

All feedback will be completed by early June.

Finalists will be selected and their work performed on stage. Their work will also be published on our website.

What happens if a finalist play has been written but the writer has no actors to perform it?

This project is in partnership with the London Streets Theatre Company - a new youth theatre company. The members will be happy to perform any piece which requires a cast. The piece can be recorded and sent to the writer if they are unable to attend.

If you feel you have access to a suitable space and would like to offer support for the Challenge in this way we would be very pleased to hear from you.

I have a heavy workload - is there any way this can dovetail into work I am doing already?

We understand that Drama teachers work long hours and this has been carefully designed so as to capitalise and concretise what you do already rather than add to workload.

This can easily sit within the Arts Awards brief as a target set at any level.

It makes a very good topic for English Speaking Board material.

This complements the BTEC course and grows from the A level devising units.

If you have a club format which nurtures vertical tutoring, more fluent writers could scribe the work of the dramatists who create the piece, which encourages collaborative relationships based on arts creation - which is after all the very thing which is needed and under threat at present.

This leaves a concrete trail of evidence which can be used to support literacy initiatives, the growth of arts communities within your school, the celebration of achievement, assessment for/by/ within learning, the creativity agenda, outreach...

Drama, Theatre and Young People ~ A Manifesto

Core Belief 2: Exceptionally able and highly motivated young drama & theatre makers should be supported and developed.

How will opportunities and pathways for exceptionally able and highly motivated young people be secured?

 Ensuring a consistent and continuous level of access to drama & theatre education within schools, colleges and youth theatres and provide opportunities for students to view professional

performances and work with professionals. • Providing regular opportunities within schools, colleges and youth theatres to perform, produce, direct and stage.

• Encouraging schools and colleges to build links with cultural organisations and centres, local clubs, youth theatres and drama groups.

• Increasing understanding of the importance of the creative industries and the range of employment and volunteering opportunities within.

· Supporting young people to develop as cultural entrepreneurs.

Establishing mechanisms to ensure that drama school auditions are accessible to young people who cannot afford them.

Core Belief 3: Successful young people's drama & theatre requires a world class workforce and infrastructure.

How do we secure a world class drama and theatre workforce and infrastructure? • Encourage greater collaboration between professional associations.

 Establish a common code of good practice to cover partnerships between formal education providers and theatre artists or companies.

· Improve signposting of careers in young people's drama and theatre.

• Strengthen mentoring and support networks for new entrants to the workforce.

• Establish models of good practice for work experience placements.

• Train building-based theatre employees in how to work with young people and with teachers.

• Encourage cultural organisations to ensure the effectiveness of the voluntary workforce and to provide appropriate training and support to volunteers.

• Encourage the sharing of resources through developing regional theatres as cultural hubs and the use of schools and other cultural centres for promoting and hosting a wide range of youth, amateur and professional theatre.

• Encourage funders to create, develop and maintain spaces and places where young people can visit and make theatre.

The London Streets Theatre School, Tottenham



The London Streets Theatre School is a non profit making social enterprise based at the Bernie Grant Arts Centre in Tottenham north London.

The Theatre company was founded by myself, Louise Munro, whilst I was Head of Drama at Greig City Academy and co founded by Loren Jacobs who has been a performer and teacher for Chicken shed Theatre Company for over 20 years.

The Theatre company, which runs weekend workshops for 11-21 year olds, was set up after the 2011 summer riots to provide an opportunity for young people in Tottenham and other boroughs of London to access the Arts and to create meaningful Theatre which gives young people a voice in society.

London Streets Theatre's first project was in June 2012 where the company worked with Documentary director, Simon Chambers, delivering a four week acting for camera course and filming a short film with four young male actors from the company.

Since September the Sunday afternoon sessions have been popular with young people attending from boroughs across London. The Workshops also aim to provide a connection between professionals from the acting industry and education by regular visits from the company's patrons who have provided workshops, industry talks and a positive role model to the young people who attend.

In 2013 the London Streets Theatre will be performing their first Performance called *Through The Eyes* at the London Drama Easter Conference. The performance will be devised by the Theatre company's young people and aims to explore society through the eyes of young people.

As Artistic director of the company I believe every borough should provide affordable opportunities for young people to meet their potential in the arts. The long term vision is to see London Streets Theatre Schools in other boroughs providing opportunity for young people.

Over the last couple months, The London Streets Theatre group has allowed us, as young people of the community, to express ourselves. We have done a number of workshops, run and led by Louise Monro, Kinsley Ben and Loren Jacobs. We have embarked on numerous activities such as image technique (freeze frames) and (still image), dance choreography and physical theatre movement. The theatre group runs every fortnight on Sundays and has been running for the last couple of months. The sessions have allowed us to become a family and highlight our individual performance talents, so much so that we have now started rehearsing for a performance which is set to be performed in April. Everyone in the theatre group is tremendously excited to begin on our first performance project together.
